GENERATIONS OF YOUNG readers have adored Judy Blume's novels, including the iconic Are You There God? It's Me, Margaret. But her new book, In the Unlikely Event, is for grownups. Set in her childhood hometown of Elizabeth, New Jersey, in the early '50s, it centers on a series of real-life plane crashes that occurred nearby.

Did you write this book based on your memories of those events? I remembered the plane crashes, but I had to do a lot of research. And I checked the period detail, like was I wearing Pixie Pink lipstick in 1952? I was. Everybody was. I want to take readers back.

Do you look back on that era fondly? I've always believed that the '50s were so boring, so bland. But, you know, there was a lot going on. It was going on in a way that was kind of undercover, though. Nobody I knew talked to their kids about real life. It was, "Don't upset the children; everything is great." I hated

secrets, so I read a lot—all the books on the bookshelves at home—to try to learn the secrets of the adult world.

What's up next for you? I have no plans to ever write a complicated, intense book like this again. I've done it—and I'm glad I did it. I may want to write a memoir, from birth to 12. I can say to you, "I'm 77," but in my mind, it's a joke. I've always felt kind of 12. —Christina Ianzito
